Safety First

Families enjoy decorating their homes for the holidays. Before you deck the halls, always check electrical cords and light strands to make sure they aren't frayed or damaged. This offers peace of mind, knowing holiday lights are ready to safely brighten your home. Also, double check the lights outside to make sure they're rated for outdoor use.

In many households, holiday-scented candles are a favorite. While festive, candles can create fire hazards and should never be left unattended. One of the best and easiest ways to safeguard your home is to test smoke alarms often. Set a schedule and test them on the first of each month, so it's easy to remember. Testing smoke alarms only takes a few seconds and could save lives, so make it a habit.

'Tis the Season for Savings

Spending more time indoors with a few more guests in the home can really impact home energy use. By taking a few small steps to save energy during the holiday season, you can lower your bills.

Encourage family members to mind the thermostat. Since heating and cooling make up the majority of home energy consumption, the thermostat is one of the best places for savings. Lower it a few degrees, especially when you have family or friends stopping by. Good company brings additional warmth to your home. My family saved energy by decorating with LED holiday lights. LEDs are the most energy-efficient lights available, and they last much longer than traditional bulbs. For example, I used a Trickle Star energy monitor on my Christmas lights after converting to LED. The cost to light my house and garage was a mere 13 cents at night, roughly \$4 a month.

There's no denying one of the best parts of the holiday season is the food—not just the meals but the time we spend together in the kitchen. There are many ways to save in the heart of your home, but one of the best approaches is to cook with smaller countertop appliances, such as air fryers, slow cookers, and toaster ovens. These handy appliances consume a fraction of the energy used to heat the oven, creating the perfect recipe for mealtime and energy savings.

Try implementing some of these energy-saving and safety tips into your holiday plans. I hope your holiday season is merry and bright.

UPDATE ON BILLING CHANGES

arlier this year, we had mentioned that we were going to bring in a new billing component for demand, which will offset some of the energy portion of the bill. We also mentioned we'd be converting from billing solar on a net basis to a wholesale purchase price for excess energy and a retail sale for member needs. We found that some of our meters were programmed for one setting and some for another. Through the winter months we will continue getting the needed changes made to the meters and will be implementing these billing changes by mid-2025.

WINTER LOAD CONTROL SEASON BEGINS

Winter full load control/peak alert events will be split into morning and evening events from December through February. A review of winter electricity peaks revealed that 60% of peaks occur in the morning. To successfully reduce electricity needs during those times, enrolled dual fuel (electric heat) loads will be controlled in the mornings, beginning approximately at 7 a.m. with restoration by 11 a.m.

Enrolled dairy water heaters, grain dryers, and manual standby generators will remain in the traditional winter schedule of control beginning at 5 p.m. with restoral by 10 p.m.

Residential water heaters and other accounts enrolled by daily storage, and EV chargers will not be affected by the split control events and will be controlled during economic control events as in the past.
