

Board Report – February 2023

- Approved January disbursements totaling \$359,251. 6 new member applications, and January 2023 construction in the amount of \$53,591.
- Reviewed financial results for January with \$80,779 Operating Margins and \$82,458 Total Margins year to date.
- There were 11 outages in January, with an average YTD outage time per meter of .0105 hours.
- One application for discounted early retirement of capital credits to an estate was approved with total capital credits of \$523 to be paid out at the net present value of \$165.
- 24 delinquent accounts were processed for collection following the February 20th due date. The total amount owing on these accounts is \$15,587.
- Other topics covered included power cost adjustments, DPC activities, solar policies, two policies, donations to local organizations, and upcoming local and national meetings.

TRANSPORT SAFELY

Keep directions (with proper road and farm ground names) at home, in the shop and in cabs



EVALUATE PROCEDURES

Consider new safety precautions you can implement, such as lockout/tagout

SHARE SAFETY TIPS

BE CLEAR

Explain where the "back 80" or Smith field is; not everyone may know how to get there



LOOK AROUND

Inspect your space and look for hazards before you start planting



MEET AND DISCUSS

Conduct morning safety meetings to brief everyone on the day and talk about potential hazards
