Call 811 before digging

National Safe Digging Day, or 811 Day, is upon us. Easy to remember because of its 8/11 date, the day is a good reminder to get underground utilities marked prior to breaking ground. Having utilities marked is free and easy to do; simply call 811 two to three business days prior

to starting your project. While state laws vary, utility companies generally have two to three days to respond to your request. Why is it necessary to get buried utilities marked? Underground lines are unyielding, and their path is unpredictable. Digging in an unmarked yard can mean striking an underground utility line, which can cause serious injury. Damaging a utility line can also cause unwanted service disruptions, including a power outage, as well as a hefty fine.

Before digging in, take these five steps to safer digging:

- Pre-mark the proposed dig area with white paint or white
- Call 811 or go online to submit your locate request before you dig. There is no charge for the service.
- Wait the required amount of time (typically two to three business days).
- Respect the marks and do not move any flags.
- Dig with care. Avoid digging on top of or within 18–24 inches on all sides of utility marks, which may mean moving your digging project to another part of your yard.

Board Report - June 2023

- Approved May disbursements totaling \$590,264. 15 new member applications, and May 2023 construction in the amount of \$37,540.
- Reviewed financial results for May with \$173,917 Operating Margins and \$190,131 Total Margins year to
- There were 6 outages in May, with an average YTD outage time per meter of .0965 hours.
- Two applications for discounted early retirement of capital credits to estates were approved with total capital credits of \$1,090 to be paid out at the net present value of \$466.
- 28 delinquent accounts were processed for collection following the June 20th due date. The total amount owing on these accounts is \$12,256.
- Other topics covered included the recap of the Annual Meeting, WECA district meetings, and DPC activities including generator performance, and safety.

YOUR Cooperative, 87 years and growing!

Taylor Electric Cooperative held its 87th Annual Meeting on Tuesday, June 27, at the Centennial Community Center in Stetsonville with 216 registered members in attendance.

In board elections, there were three open seats and four candidates running. Incumbents Donald Everhard and Charles Zenner were both re-elected, and newcomer Paul Woods won the final seat.

Members also voted to pass three bylaw amendments related to board director tenure, filling a vacant board seat, and the process of setting per diem. The approved changes include extending the consecutive number of three-year terms a board director may serve from five to six, and ensuring members have the opportunity to review and modify changes to per diems. The board thanked outgoing director Patricia Waldhart for her 16.5 years of service to the board. After serving five terms, Waldhart was not eligible to run again.

President/CEO Ken Ceaglske began his presentation by reporting sales increased 4% in 2022, compared to 2021, and more than 50% of the co-op budget went to pay for wholesale power. Due to an increased cost of wholesale power, the co-op had \$140,000 in power cost adjustments over the year. Members received capital credits totaling nearly \$350,000, bringing the total to-date to more than \$8.9 million.

Ceaglske said the cooperative is doing a cost-of-service study this summer that may lead to overall changes to the rate structure in 2024.

Ceaglske addressed the membership with the five main issues that members bring up, including how rates are determined and how they compare to the rates of nearby municipalities, what demand charges are and how they affect the cooperative, how the co-op prioritizes which outages to restore first, what capital credits are and how they get allocated and the viability of electric vehicles in Taylor's service territory.

In his report, Chairman Hallgren thanked directors, co-

op employees, and members, saying, "Our members are the reason our cooperative exists. Thanks to each of you for your support. It is an honor and a privilege to serve you."
