Call Before You Dig (811) is a free service that will have buried public utilities marked on your property so that you can safely dig around them. Just call 811, or call811.com at least a few business days before you plan to dig.

When calling, make sure that you have clearly identified your planned digging area and outline it in white paint if possible. The service uses ground-penetrating radar to search for and locate the buried public utility lines that are on your property. Lines will be marked with flags or paint. The color indicates the type of utility located. After the area has been marked, the CGA reports that you have less than 1 percent chance of causing damage if you respect the markings.

If you have any private utilities, you will need to hire a private utility locator. Some examples of private utilities include: underground sprinkler system, invisible fences, data communication systems, private water systems, or gas piping to a garage.

Even if you have had an area marked before, call to have the area checked again. Natural changes to the soil, such as erosion or root growth, can alter the depth and location of buried lines. Once all buried lines have been marked. respect the boundaries, and dig carefully.

Board Report – February 2017

- Approved January disbursements totaling \$861,410.25, accepted 3 new member applications, reviewed credit card expenses, and December construction in the amount of \$40,743.34.
- Reviewed financial results through January 31, 2017 with a net margin of \$37,919.
- Reviewed 80 delinquent accounts that were processed for collection in February owing more than \$34,800.
- A report on the February safety meeting was given by Director Smith and included: safety harness suspension trauma; a close call for a lineman where he
 was struck in the face by a tree branch which broke his nose; and, truck and equipment inspections.
- The audit of the Co-op's 2016 financial records is taking place March 6-7, 2017. Director Engel will meet
 with the auditors to discuss any areas of concern.
- A review of the Co-op's Emergency Load Reduction Policy (ELRP) was completed, including an update of a drill coordinated by Dairyland Power Cooperative to test the ELRP preparedness.
- The Board discussed the 2017 annual meeting: agenda, speakers, meal, prizes, and Board elections.
- The Board approved discounted early retirement of capital credits to one estate with a net present value of \$117.12.
- 2017 billable labor rates were set at \$70 per hour during business hours (\$80 for non-members), and

\$100 per hour for all overtime.

- No action was taken on a member issue related to a request for service from a neighboring utility.
- The Board approved a list of questions and other issues to be sent in response to Dairyland Power's request for comments on extension of the Wholesale Power Contract.
- The Board approved a bad debt write-off of \$116.80 on one account. The bad debt will be recovered from the NWPA refund in March.
- Dairyland Power Cooperative's January financial report was reviewed with \$4 Million of Operating Margins, 18.8% member equity, and kWh sales 1.3% less than January 2016.
- Items reviewed from a Legal Update attended by the CEO and directors included: membership agreements, easements, bylaws, policies, and employee handbook issues.
 - * The winter moratorium ends April 15th. All past due balances must be paid in full prior to this date to avoid disconnection of service.
