LAST CHANCE

to take advantage of Focus on Energy's refrigerator recycling program

Focus on Energy will be discontinuing its refrigerator recycling program after January 22, 2021, which will be the last day for pick-ups.

This change indicates that initiatives promoting the need to safely recycle old, inefficient appliances have been successful. Participation has declined partially because there are fewer and fewer older refrigerators and freezers still remaining in households.

The last day you can schedule a pickup of your old refrigerator or freezer is December 15, 2020, with January 22, 2021, as the last day for pick-ups. Please keep in mind that due to Covid-19 restrictions, pickups are limted to outdoors only; Focus on Energy staff cannot enter homes to retrieve appliances.





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
